
RICE PADDY ISAO MIURA

New multi-media paintings 2020/21

I am a painter and sculptor, born in a small village in Akita, north Japan. My family have been rice farmers for many generations and I used to help with sowing and tending the paddies from about the age of six.

The old house we lived in, with its central fire pit and ladders hooked to the rafters, has long gone. So have a lot of the back-breaking routines, replaced by ingenious machines. But clean water is still as important now as ever. Maybe more so, because it is under sustained attack from acid rain and all sorts of pesticides, herbicides, fungicides applied during the land preparation, seeding and harvesting cycles (roughly April to October).

Rice is Japan's staple food and the character for a rice paddy is one of the most basic: a square box, divided into four segments.



This simple window-like shape which pervades Japanese culture is the template for a new series of paintings which take me back to my roots in the glittering wet countryside of north Japan, the play of light on watery soil, dichotomies of earth and sky, day and night.

Winter (stalks and oil paint on canvas, 44 x 44 cms)




Warm Rain (stalks and oil paint on canvas, 44 x 44 cms)

Fireflies 1 & 2 (stalks and oil paint on canvas, 40 x 80 cms)




Warm Rain 2 & Nursery Shoots (stalks & oil on canvas, 40 x 80 cms)
